## UNIVERSITY OF MANCHESTER FOUNDER'S DAY CELEBRATIONS

Vice-Chancellor Distinguished professors Ladies and Gentleman

The anniversary which the University of Manchester now celebrates – one hundred and fifty years of learning and discoveries, teaching and research – embraces momentous contributions not only to the growth of this splendid city but also to the scientific community in Great Britain and to international co-operation and progress.
