

## A Greeting from the President of Iceland Ólafur Ragnar Grímsson

A thousand years ago one of the great women in Icelandic history, Guðríður Þorbjarnardóttir, arrived in Rome with news of a new continent west of the ocean where she had not only voyaged but also lived for a while. She was the first person in history to visit both Rome and America and the most remarkable female explorer of all time – and crossed the Atlantic 500 years before Christopher Columbus.

In Iceland Margrét J. Pálmadóttir has really become a cultural institution in her own right, and it is our good fortune that she has devoted her energies to the arts. Now she has been honoured with a special invitation to Rome and we congratulate her and her choir members.

When women from three Icelandic choirs – Vox Feminae, the Reykjavík Gospel Sisters and Domus Vox – begin their song in Rome, their voices will bring greetings from the island in the north where the Almighty is still creating a new world, where the forces of nature and the rhythms of ever-changing light present us every day with a wondrous experience.
